BUCKLAND: A VIRGINIA TIME CAPSULE

Visited Washington. Jefferson. bv Madison, Monroe, Lafayette, Stuart and Lee, the town plan of Buckland is a rare example of the familiar axial English village pattern. The main house and the town below, extending outward from its gate, stand on land that was originally part of the Broad Run Tract owned by the family of Robert (King) Carter.² The Carter family operated a mill on the property in the early 1770's and conveyed the land to Samuel Love in 1774. During the late eighteenth century. Love and his four sons Samuel, John, Charles and Augustine transformed the property into a vibrant mercantile The Loves' development of Buckland began with the construction of the main house in 1774. The single pile stone residence is attributed to architect commonly

Buckland but has not been documented. Beside the existing mill, Love built an assortment of secondary structures for production of farm goods at the base of the lane leading to the main house. In 1775, he petitioned the General Assembly to re-route the Old Carolina road so it would run directly to these outbuildings and another beyond, to Thoroughfare Gap. Soon, the distillery, blacksmith, tannery, store and a second mill were being frequented by travelers. Outside merchants arrived, leased adjoining parcels and built stores of their own. By the end of the eighteenth century there were shopkeepers, a tailor, saddle maker, wheelwright, boot/shoe manufacturer, cooper, two taverns, an apothecary, church and a woolen factory – the essentials of a small town.


When Samuel Love died in 1787, John Love inherited the main house. In 1797, by petition to the General Assembly, he laid out a grid of lots around the irregular clusters of shops and outbuildings described in this document as "upwards of twenty good houses occupied by tradesmen and merchants." The Virginia General Assembly established the "forty-eight lott plan of the Town of Buckland in 1798." At the same time, John Love and his brothers bred horses, operated a stone quarry, farmed on an extensive scale and experimented with several varieties of wheat for grinding in their mills. They were growing a strand of wheat called the Lawler, which had a natural resistance to the Hessian Fly, an insect that devastated the U.S. wheat crop during the early nineteenth century. In a letter from John Love to President Madison, Love stated that President Monroe, who

had visited Buckland "and who being satisfied from the appearance of the Lawler wheat contrasted with the common kinds, that it was not injured by the Hessian Fly, engaged with me (John Love) for 200 bushels for himself and would also reserve the same quantity for" Presidents Madison and Jefferson. John Love also




corresponded with Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe, Patrick Henry, Andrew Jackson, James Cabell and other notables about the agricultural and political issues of the day.

Buckland also known for its horses. Beginning in the 1780's, John and Samuel Love imported Arabian and fine European horses to breed. The blood-lines of their stallions Mohamet and Spread Eagle are listed among the origins of the modern thoroughbred. This operation became one of the first large-scale breeding farms

Virginia. In 1789, General George Washington bought one of these horses "for his own use." He corresponded with and introduced the Loves to James McHenry, Secretary of War under President John Adams. The Loves furnished McHenry with a large number of horses for the U.S. Army in 1799.

Buckland continued to prosper through the first part of the nineteenth century. In 1806, newly elected Congressman John Love formed the Fauquier-Alexandria Turnpike Company and built a road from the Little River Turnpike at Fairfax Courthouse to Buckland. The company was reorganized in 1821 as the Alexandria-Warrenton Turnpike Company and it was decided at that time, to extend the road from Buckland to Warrenton.


Notable French Engineer Claudius Crozet was engaged to design the new thoroughfare. The town trustees and Crozet also determined that Buckland would improved by building the new turnpike through the center of town rather than at the north end where Bridge Street, Love Street and the old wooden bridge over Broad Run had accommodated through travelers since 1775. The project would require an area of land




from the original Plan of the Town the width of one lot from east to west. Lots 31, 5, 14 and 28 were condemned in 1823 and Crozet constructed the new road using a revolutionary process of paving invented by John Loudon McAdam. It was the first road of its type in Virginia. Crozet also designed Buckland's stone bridge, the first of its type in America, on "the Pike," as it was locally known. The bridge abutments of this

French design still stand and are visible today from Route 29. Several new buildings and stores, including the Stagecoach Inn, were built beside the new paved road.

Between the time of its construction and the Civil War a number of famous figures visited Buckland on the Pike. In 1825, General Lafayette traveled the road on the last leg of his triumphant tour and was received by local citizens at the Buckland Tavern. In 1830, Mrs. Anne Royall, a notoriously critical travel writer, followed the road to Buckland. In her book, "Mrs. Royall's Southern Tour," she described the town as "a romantic, lively, business-doing village, situated on a rapid, rolling stream...several manufactories are propelled by this stream which adds much to the scenery. Buckland owns the largest distillery I have seen in my travels. The buildings, vats and vessels are quite a show. There is also flour manufactory here on a very extensive scale—this stream is a fund of wealth to the citizens...encompassed with rising grounds and rocks, the roaring of the water-falls, and the town stretching up and scattering from the stream to the top of the hills, was truly picturesque." She further described Buckland as "a real Yankee town for business"—one of her kinder reviews. Constant travel brought new enterprises, such as the Pony Express and William Smith's stagecoach line. By 1835, Buckland was a thriving stagecoach town complete with its own Post Office and Stagecoach Inn. The local population consisted of one hundred thirty whites and fifty blacks, some of whom were freed slaves. The African-American citizens of Buckland, from the beginning, were skilled laborers who, in the late eighteenth century, owned land and slaves of their own. Rather than assuming the name of another, one former slave who must have been proud of his work in the Buckland Distillery, called himself "Ned Distiller" and is listed on the 1810 census as freed. Samuel King of Buckland, freeman of colour, emancipated his wife Celia and others in 1811.





In 1840, John Love sold Buckland to George Washington's first cousin and followed his friend Andrew Jackson west to Tennessee, with whom he had been involved in Kentucky and Tennessee land speculation. Eppa Hunton, of Balls Bluff fame, built a school in Buckland in 1841 and instructed law to the sons of Judge John Webb Tyler and others. In 1853, Temple Mason Washington conveyed Buckland Farm to Richard Bland Lee II, son of Congressman Richard Bland Lee of Sully, nephew of "Lighthorse Harry" and first cousin of General Robert E. Lee. Lee obtained the rank of Major in the U.S. Army and was appointed the same rank in the Confederate States Army.

During the Civil War, Buckland became a prime target due to its mills and proximity to the Warrenton Turnpike, which had become a primary route of east-west travel. The first shots of the Battle of Second Manassas were fired on Crozet's stone bridge in August 1862. Then, on 19 October 1863 the Confederate Cavalry enjoyed its final southern victory at Buckland where it defeated Generals Kilpatrick and George Armstrong Custer. Sometimes referred to as "Custer's First Stand," it was Custer's most serious defeat prior to the Battle at Little Big Horn. After the Confederates recaptured Crozet's Bridge, they sent the Yankees



scrambling on a five-mile steeplechase along the Warrenton Turnpike. General J.E.B. Stuart humorously called the victory "The Buckland Races" as if it had been a glorious foxhunt and later, in his official record stated "I am justified in declaring the rout of the enemy at Buckland the most single and complete that any cavalry has suffered during the war." Recognized as the best of the Civil War sketch artists, Alfred Waud documented the battle at Buckland in two sketches. "Buckland from Mr. Hunton's House, scene of cavalry

engagement with Stuart" was engraved for use on the front page of Harper's Magazine in November 1863. Forbes and other artists documented the events at Buckland by sketch and engraving. General Robert E. Lee wrote to General Stuart on the day of the battle at Buckland, "I congratulate you and your officers and your men on this handsome success. The plan was well conceived and skillfully executed." On 21 October 1863, General Lee must have been pleased to write to his wife with news of victory so late in the war, "We met separately and collectively the three Yankee Divisions of Cavalry, Bedford's Regulars, Gregg's and Kilpatrick's and whipt them every time!...Gen. Stuart retreated designedly before them toward Warrenton and Our Divisions, under Gen. Fitz Lee came up perpendicular to the Pike and cut their column in two. The surprise was complete and we ran them as far as we could see them. Captured half their ambulances, one wagon loaded with ammunitions, one loaded with medical stores and 800 prisoners." The Union Army suffered 230 casualties and the Buckland Tavern and Church were used as hospitals.

Richard Bland Lee and his descendants lived at Buckland until 1935. Mrs. R.B. Lee's first cousin, painter John Singer Sargent, visited Buckland Hall on several occasions during the late nineteenth century and painted a rare watercolor of the house in 1887. He also painted three large oil landscapes of various views of the farm. In 1935, the property was sold to Mitchell Harrison, who hired architect Irwin Fleming for the restoration of the main house.

The property was later sold to Thomas Mellon Evans, a noted Wall Street financier, philanthropist and horse breeder. Mr. Evans spent the next four decades developing a state-of-the-art thoroughbred farm at Buckland, the first in Virginia to be laid out in the Kentucky style. His championship horses included Pleasant Colony, winner of the 1981 Kentucky Derby and Preakness Stakes. Pleasant Colony died on New Year's Eve 2002 and was buried at Buckland within sight of the barn where he was foaled.

The Town of Buckland, listed on the National Register of Historic Places, remains a rare example of a vernacular stagecoach town that represents the early industrialization of America with its mills, factories, merchants and tradesmen rather than the grand or high-style, which has been preserved elsewhere, in places like Williamsburg. The Pony Express, stagecoach line and the McAdam turnpike road, that exemplified the early transportation system in this country, all converged at Buckland and made it the vibrant place of business described by all accounts. The railroads, steam power and Civil War reconstruction changed this way of life in America but bypassed Buckland completely. Much of the little town that grew from the eighteenth century secondary structures survives, remarkably undisturbed by the development and change experienced in other places. An archeological study of the 48-lot Plan of the Town of Buckland is especially exciting, as Buckland has lost only four of its original lots to the expansion of Route 29. The condemnation of those parcels occurred in 1824, when the road was extended to Warrenton. This unusual circumstance has left the stratigraphy and archeology associated with the remaining 92% of the Town little disturbed since the eighteenth century. Like a time capsule, many of the eighteenth century stone foundations remain in place along with the artifacts associated with each parcel. In preserving this site we have perhaps the best chance at demonstrating everyday life in old Virginia, as most of these more modest places have disappeared long ago. The present owner of Buckland Hall has formed a non-profit foundation, the Buckland Preservation Society, for the purpose of conducting a state-of-the-art investigation and study of the archeology, architecture, cultural landscape and historical record of the Town of Buckland. Our board of directors is devoted to preserving this site for the Commonwealth.

Recently, I was delighted with the opportunity to walk in the footsteps of none other than George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, Lafayette, Jeb Stuart and Robert E. Lee as I toured the remarkably preserved ancient industrial river town of Buckland, Virginia. For over four decades, I have championed the unique value and survival of historical places significant to understanding what it means to be an American. So to discover Buckland to be such an architectural and archaeological time-capsule surviving literally in the shadow of suburban Washington, DC development was particularly encouraging to me. In my opinion, properly protected and researched, Buckland has the unique potential to teach generations to come much about American values, especially the role of free enterprise, in the development and growth of the United States during its founding years between the American Revolution and the Civil War Era. Too often, as at Jamestown, no architectural landscape and few documents survive to help tell significant pieces of the archaeological part of that story as it does at Buckland.

The preservation and research of Buckland can stand as a prime example of how Americana progress and significantly unique historic places can co-exist as well. However, it was also crystal-clear to me that the Buckland story is difficult if not impossible to tell amid the incessant roar of traffic on the major highway, US Route 29 that intrudes upon it While the construction and expansion of Rt. 29 through the years fortunately has only taken a small slice off one end of the town so far, in my personal opinion its re-routing and/or down-scaling is essential to allowing Buckland to reach its true potential value as a major American historical, architectural, and archaeological laboratory/site.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR AFFIDAVITS

transcribed & submitted by Ronald R. Turner

Found among the Prince William County Court House loose papers and copied as they were written.

Prince William County to Wit.

On this 3rd day of October 1820 personally appeared in open Court being a court of record for said county Thomas Mahornev aged ninety one resident in said county who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows, viz In the 2nd VA Regiment commanded by Col. Wm. Brent and in the Company commanded by Captain Quarles and in the Virginia (word not legible) and the number of the Certificate as pensioner is 8654 and that his original declaration is dated on the 22nd day of May in the year 1818 And the said Thomas Mahorney solemnly swears that he was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818, And that he has not since that time by gift-sale or in any manner disposed of his property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to being himself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War, passed on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed.

Schedule of articles of Real or personal estate belonging to Thomas Mahorney, necessary clothing & bedding excepted – Real property – none, Personal property one old Bok – old chairs – 1 old pot – 2 hoes – the whole estimated to be worth two dollars.

And the said Thos. Mahorney declares that he is a planter on a little piece of land not his and is rendered unable to pursue it by reason of his age infirmity and that his family resides with him are as follows – Viz – His wife Mima & his son Jack both

of which are Slaves, he the said Thomas Mahorney being a free man of Colour who served in the war of the revolution – and is now assisted by the labour of his family

Sworn to and declared in open Court, property valued by this Court in Schedule at \$2.00

District of Virginia to wit:

On this 4th day of September One Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty, personally appeared in open court being a court of record for said district and the county of Prince William. John Franklin Jr. aged sixty eight years, resident in the aforesaid county and district aforesaid, who being first duly sworn according to Law, doth, on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows, viz: That he the said John Franklin Jr. enlisted for the term of one year, early in September One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy Five, in the State of Virginia, in the Company commanded by Capt. William Taliaferro, in the regiment commanded by Col. William Woodford, in the line of the State of Virginia on the Continental establishment that he continued to serve in the said corps until the twenty seventh of August seventeen hundred and seventy six, when he was discharged from the said service in Williamsburg in Virginia as appears by a certificate of Col. Woodford to the court now here shown that his original declaration was made on the twenty third day of September Eighteen Hundred and eighteen. And that he has received a pension under the original certificate, the number of which is Two Thousand eight hundred and twenty four and that he was in the battles of the Great Bridge when Capt. Fordyce was killed. And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818, And that he has not since that time by gift, sale, or in any manner disposed of his property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to being himself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War, passed on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed.

Schedule of J. Franklin's property: One mare, 12 years old; 1 blind horse 14 years old; 1 cow and 1 heifer; 2 chests; 1 folding walnut table; 6 common chairs; 1 pine cup-board; 1 dutch oven; 1 iron pot; 1 cutting axe; 1 person wedges; 1 old hand-saw; 3 augers; 1 skellet; 1 grid iron; 1/2 doz. knives and forkes; 1/2 dozen pewder spoons; 1 old saddle; 1 pr. steelyards; 1 plough & gear; My family are my wife, Nancy Franklin very infirm and aged 63 years, my daughter, Mary Franklin aged 27 years. I am engaged in agriculture, aged and afflicted with disease and not able to provide a support for myself, wife and child; my daughter has no trade.

Which property is valued by the court as worth four dollars. sworn to and declared on the 4th day of Sept. 1820 before me in open court.

The 1880 index to the Agricultural Schedule for Prince William County, Virginia, includes the first eight columns out of a total of 100 columns.

Column one gives name of the person who conducts the farm. Specified in the next three columns is if this person is the owner, rents for a fixed money rental or rents for shares of the products. The next four columns reports on acres of land. Under the heading of improved acres, column five is for acres of tilled, including fallow and grass in rotation (whether pasture or meadow) and column six is for permanent meadows, permanent pastures, orchards, or vineyards. Under the heading of unimproved acreage: column seven is for acres of woodland and forest and column eight reports on other unimproved, including "old fields" not growing wood. Page numbers and line number with their district name abbreviation follows the transcribed columns.

Previous indexes to the Agricultural Schedules for Prince William County and a listing of columns for 1850 can be found in Vol.1, no.1 of *Prince William Reliquary*. The 1860 index to the Agricultural Schedule can be found in Vol. 1, no. 2, and the 1870 index to the Agricultural Schedule is in Vol. 1, no. 3.

"Page & al. v Masons Est. Pltf. Costs \$6.54" Chancery Cause. John Page, William Page, Thomas Swann and wife Jane, Pltf. vs. George Mason Deft. Mrs. Ann Mason, deceased, possessed land in Prince William County which had been purchased by her from John Peake and Henry Filkins. Mrs. Mason made her Last Will and Testament around 1762 and the following was cited in this cause:

"Item I leave the lands I bought of John Peake and Henry Filkins to be sold by my Executors and Legally Conveyed to the purchaser or purchasers and their heirs, as also All the rest of my personal Estate not before Disposed of for the payment of my debts and Legacies and the Overplus if any to be equally divided between my grand~" *[continued next page]*

Page 22.

"Children Samuel Seldon and Mary Seldon aforesaid" Mrs. Ann Mason appointed her sons George Mason, Thompson Mason and her friend John Moncure as her executors. This was followed by the death of Moncure then followed by the death of Thompson Mason. George Mason, the surviving Executor, made his Last Will and Testament, naming his son George Mason and his friend Martin Cockburn his Executor, and then he died. Cockburn refused to act as Executor and George Mason qualified and continues to act as Executor. That George Mason is the deft. in this Cause.

The Pltf. ask the Court to make George Mason a defendant in their Bill of Complaints. Their claim is that the debts of Mrs. Mason have in whole or mostly been paid, but that the land purchased from Peake has been withheld from sale. Samuel Selden, grandson of Mrs. Ann Mason, died an infant, under 21-years-old. Thus Mary Selden became entitled to the whole surplus from the sale of the land. Mary Selden married Mann Page, now dec'd, her issue being the pltfs John and William Page and Jane Swann.

Page 23.

Mary, after the death of her husband, remarried to William Carey Selden. Mary Selden died "somewhere about the latter part of 1787" without issue by Selden.

The orators and Jane are the children and legal representatives of the said Mary Selden and are entitled to the surplus from the sale of the land. This has been discussed with George Mason and he is agreeable to a decree directing the sale of the land, he further states that there is some amount due his father, dec'd, from the Ann Mason Estate and that any surplus could then be divided among the pltfs. The pltfs request the Court to make a decree for the sale of the land, i.e. a Writ of Sup.

Willoughby Tebbs and Elizabeth refuse to honor the claimed agreement. Gardiner has regularly paid the rent to Tebbs since the death of Carr.

Gardiner claims under the strict rules of Common Law the agreement should stand. Gardiner was represented by Charles Simms.

HOLLYWOOD OUT OF PRINCE WILLIAM

The late pop singer **Rosemary Clooney** and her nephew, movie star **George Clooney**, have ancestral ties to Prince William County. As reported at www.genealogy.com/famousfolks/rosemaryc/index.html they descend from Joseph Farrow who was born here about 1742. Additional information is from http://www.eonline.com/Facts/People/Bio/0,128,15,00.html and from cited materials in RELIC, which take the lineage back two more generations.

1. Abraham Farrow, b. ca. 1660; d. 1728/30, Overwharton Parish, Stafford Co., Va.; m. 1691, Stafford Co., Margaret, widow of Edward Mason [Stafford Co. Order Book 1689-93, p. 142, from abstract by Ruth and Sam Sparacio]. In 1703 Abraham Farrow was described as a millwright, running a mill on Quantico Creek [Stafford Co. Deeds and Wills "Z" p. 225-226, from abstract by Ruth and Sam Sparacio]. This land has been within Prince William County since 1731. As Abram Farrow Sr. of Stafford Co. he bought land in Apr. 1728 [Stafford Co. Deed Book J, p. 507-514]. His undated will resulted in a judgment in Stafford Co. court dated 15 Oct. 1730 that was appealed to the General Court 17 Apr. 1731, and was finally probated in Stafford Co. on 9 June 1731. The will mentions his sons John, William (2), and Abraham Farrow. Also daughter Mary Davies wife of Joseph Davis [sic], granddaughter Lydia Scurlock, daughter Lydia Barker wife of Leonard Barker, daughter in law (stepdaughter) Margaret Bennett wife of William Bennett, daughter Rose Filkins wife of Henry Filkins, and wife Margaret Farrow. [Stafford Co. Will Book M, p. 29-35, from abstract by Ruth and Sam Sparacio] The International Genealogical Index (www.familysearch.org) shows only one Abraham Farrow born in the period 1640-1680: Abraham Farrow, baptized 9 Oct. 1653 at Staindorp, Durham, England, son of John Farrow. A Parent Search on the CD-ROM version of the IGI (not currently available online) reveals that John Farrow had the following children baptized at Staindorp:

- i. Isabel, bapt. 22 Dec. 1651 (mother not identified)
- ii. Abraham, bapt. 9 Oct. 1653 (mother not identified)
- iii. Jane, bapt. 15 Feb. 1657 (mother identified as Muriell)
- iv. John, bapt. 10 Mar. 1659 (mother identified as Mirrell)
- v. Thomas, bapt. 28 July 1661 (mother not identified)
- vi. John. bapt. 16 Sept. 1666 (mother identified as Miriell)

If this is the right family, Abraham's eldest son being named John would make him a namesake for his grandfather. The link is not yet proven. A record of Abraham's immigration to American has not been found.

2. William Farrow, b. ca. 1700; d. 1754, Prince William Co., Va.; m. before 1734, Ann [Thornton?]. Shown as head of a household in 1724, and over age 16 [probably over 21], next to the households of his father Abraham and his brother Abraham [tobacco tenders list in George H. S. King, *The Register of Overwharton Parish, Stafford County, Virginia*, p. 161]. Will dated 29 Jan. 1754, probated 25 Mar. 1754, mentions wife Ann, sons Alexander, William, **Joseph (3)**, and Thornton Farrow, daughters Ann, Lidia, and Rodey Farrow, granddaughter Joanna Farrow. [Prince William Land Causes 1793-1811, p. 8-15 & 245, from abstract by William L. Hopkins in *Some Wills from the Burned Counties of Virginia*, p. 220] William Farrow and his brother

Abraham were granted land in Prince William County in 1731. [Northern Neck Grants, Book C, p. 201]

- **3. Joseph Farrow**, b. ca. 1742, Prince William Co., Va.; d. 1784, Loudoun Co., Va.; m. Elizabeth Masterson, b. ca. 1744. His will, dated 18 May 1781, probated 13 Apr. 1784, mentions wife Elizabeth, and children Mary Ann, Sarah, **William (4)**, Thornton, Joseph, and Thomas Farrow. [Loudoun County Will Book C, p. 72-73, from abstract by Ruth and Sam Sparacio] Alexander Farrow is the head of a household in Loudoun County in 1761; with him are William and Joseph Farrow, both over 16, apparently his brothers named above. [*Loudoun County, Virginia, Tithables, 1758-1786*, by Marty Hiatt and Craig Roberts Scott (Iberian Pub. Co., 1995), p. 79]
- **4. William Farrow**, member of the Kentucky legislature, b. 1771, Va.; d. 1844, Fleming Co., Ky.; m. 1793, Fayette Co., Ky., Elizabeth Shore.
- **5. Orson Dogan Farrow**, b. 1805; m. 1829, Elizabeth O. Bruer.
- **6. John B. Farrow**, b. 1833, Ky.; m. 1857, Martha Jane Bramel, b. 1840, Ky.
- **7. Samuel Tully Farrow**, b. 1858, Mason Co., Ky.; d. 1916, Mason Co., Ky.; m. Louella Breckenridge Vanden, b. 1860, Mason Co., Ky.; d. 1935, Mason Co., Ky.
- **8.** Adelia Farrow, b. 1884, d. 1958; m. Michael J. Guilfoyle, b. 1876, d. 1928.
- **9. Frances Marie Guilfoyle**, b. 1909, d. 1973; m. Andrew Joseph Clooney, b. 1902; d. 1974. Their children: **Rosemary** (1928-2002), Betty (1931-1976), and **Nicholas J. Clooney** (b. 1934).
- **10. Rosemary Clooney**, singer and actress, b. 1928, Maysville, Ky.; d. 2002; m. (1953-61 and 1963-67) Jose Ferrer (1912-1992), 7 children; m. 3rd (1997) Dante DiPaolo, b. 1926.
- **10. Nicholas J. Clooney**, broadcast journalist, b. 1934, m. Nina Bruce Warren. Their children: Ada (b. 1959) and **George** (b. 1961).
- 11. George Clooney, actor, b. 1961, Lexington, Ky.; m. (1989-1992) Talia Balsam.
